ARMY PLAN OF OPERATION

- DEPUTY CHIEF OF THE AIR CORPS, OSCAR WESTOVER, APPOINTED
- 3 ZONES OF RESPONSIBILITY CREATED, EAST, CENTRAL AND WEST
- EXISTING CAM ROUTES MODIFIED FOR COVERAGE AND EFFICIENCY
- ALL ARMY AIR CORPS RESOURCES MADE AVAILABLE
- ARMY WOULD FLY DAY, NIGHT SCHEDULE
- SEVERAL WEEKS TRAINING AND PREPARATIONS WOULD ALLOW SMOOTH AND SAFE TRANSITION

THE PLOT THICKENS

ROOSEVELT ONLY GIVES ARMY 10 DAYS

WEATHER WAS HORRIBLE— HUGE ARCTIC STORM FORECAST

ARMY AIRPLANES DID NOT HAVE NIGHT OR INSTRUMENT CAPABILITY

PILOTS HAD LITTLE TRAINING ON INSTRUMENTS/ROUTE NAVIGTION

ARMY SUPPORT ELEMENTS THINLY SPREAD ACROSS THE COUNTRY



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ACTION

- 4 CRASHES AND 3 AIRCREW DEATHS DURING TRAINING, BEFORE ONE LETTER WAS CARRIED
- STORM PREVENTED TIMELY START UP ON EASTERN ZONE ROUTES
- MOST MAIL WAS DELIVERED ON SCHEDULE IN SPITE OF THE DIFFICULTIES
- THE PRESS AND PUBLIC WERE HIGHLY CRITICAL OF THE ARMY'S PERFORMANCE
- MANY AVIATION NOTABLES BAD MOUTHED THE ARMY EFFORT
- AIRLINES BEGAN TO RETHINK THE FUTURE AND REORGANIZE


